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DOOLEY BACK ALL THE WAY WITH 20 KM WIN

San Francisco, June 8—Tom Dooley, seen in only occasional races since the Munich Olympic Final in 1972, has come back all the way this year with a win in the NAAU Senior 20 Km Walk today. Escaping a tenacious Bob Henderson in the final 5 Km, Dooley chalked up his first national win since May 23, 1971 when he also won the 20 Km here. Dooley's final time was 1:35:52, 3½ minutes slower than 4 years ago, but good enough for an important win. Henderson finished 25 seconds behind but walked a very strong competitive race and left 15 Km winner, John Knifton, well back in third.

Ron Laird, who had looked unbeatable a couple of months ago, forced the early pace, but, for some reason, was experimenting with his style. He reportedly looked terrible, as well as uncomfortable. The judges wholly concurred with this and asked him to kindly remove himself from the course after but 2½ miles. This left Dooley, Henderson, Knifton, and defending champion, Jerry Brown, fighting for the title. Both Brown, and Knifton had an early caution and John eventually dropped off the leaders. Brown, meanwhile, engaged in a series of hard bursts in an effort to drop Henderson, who would not let him by. The end result was the old heave-ho for Jerry during one of these bursts at about 12 km. With Knifton now well back, it was just a question of hanging on for Dooley and Henderson to capture berths on the International squad. Apparently for naught as it turned out as the USSR trip went up in a squabble over TV rights. Dooley did manage to get on a trip to Finland and England following the AAU T&F meet but Bob apparently is left in Champaign, qualified with no place to go. At this point, even the West German and African meet in Durham is up in the air since it was learned at the AAU meet that American officials evidently were not planning a walk, although the West Germans were planning to bring four walkers. Efforts are in progress to resolve this situation, hopefully in favor of our walkers. What looked like a tremendous season of International competition is fast falling apart.

DID I SAY MEXICO WAS TOUGH? YOU HAD BETTER BELIEVE IT!

London, June 1—In an international race-walking match, Mexico, led by a superb 20-km performance by Domingo Colin overcame West Germany and Great Britain. The Mexicans were expected to do well in the 20 Km but to be hurt at 50 from a lack of depth. Such was not the case. After moving ahead in the 20 Km, their young walkers came through with 2nd, 4th, 6th, and 7th at 50 to easily retain the lead. Their easy victory came despite a well below par performance by Raul Gonzalez, who could finish only 6th in the 20.

That race was expected to be a great dual between Gonzalez and Bernd Kammerberg, with Olly Flynn and Roger Mills not far out of it. Instead, it was Colin who fought Kammerberg all the way and then pulled well clear in the final 5 km to record an outstanding 1:26:37.4. The West German ace was 18 seconds back at the finish after matching Colin's splits of 21:59, 43:37, and 1:05:30. That 21:07 over the last five was too much even for the super-strong Kammerberg. Meanwhile, British third string Brian Adams was a surprising third as both Flynn and Mills faded badly. West Germany lost points when both Helmut Stolte and Siegfried Richter were disqualified.

In the 50, Pedro Aroche, Enrique Vera, and Daniel Bautista all stayed close to German veteran Gerhard Weidner through 30 Km, with Vera actually leading at the point. However, Weidner proved too strong with a 1:39:17 over the last 20 Km for a final 4:03:52. Only Aroche stayed at all close, finally finishing 5 minutes down. The other two, although fading rather badly, had stayed up long enough to insure the surprising Mexican victory.

The results I have of these races show both as being on the track, but I don't think that is correct. In any case, here is how they finished:

EAST GERMANS, SOVIETS STILL STRONG, HOWEVER

Strong as the Mexican team looks, they still have a way to go to catch the East German or Soviet teams. In the annual international races at Naumburg, the East Germans took the first seven spots at 20 Km over a strong field. However, there is a chink in their armor, with the retirement of Hohne and Salzer at 50. If they are to challenge the USSR in the Lugano Cup, a couple of their 20 men will have to move up. Stadtmüller and Zschneiger would seem the most likely. Even at that, they will certainly have their hands full judging from the amazing depth shown by the Soviets in races at Uzhgorod in April. Eugene, Ore., June 21—Ron Laird took the lead on the fourth lap and was never headed as he picked up his 59th Senior AAU title in the 5 Km walk at the NAAU T & F Championships here tonight. Only NYAC teammate, John Knifton, was able to stay at all close to the veteran Laird. Forgetting about the new style that had cost him a DQ at the National 20, Laird looked his old self in his untroubled win in a rather surprisingly slow race. The results:

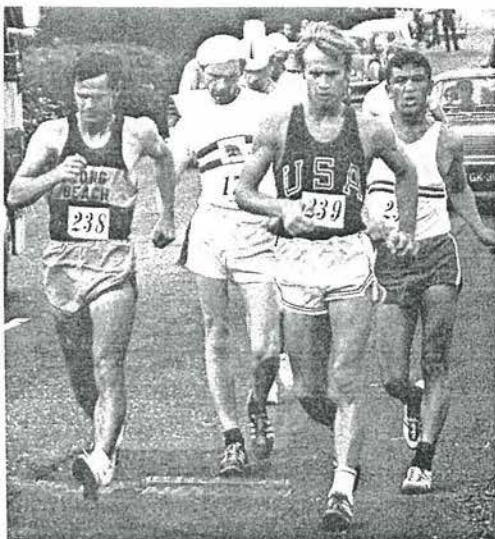

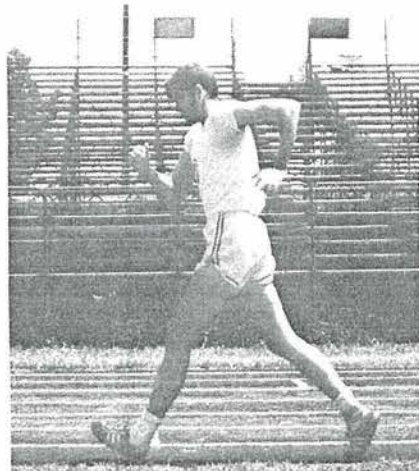

Looking Back

10 Years Ago (From the June 1965 ORW)—Art Mark covered 34½ laps up and down a shopping center mallway to win the McKeesport International 20 Km in 1:38:06 with your editor 53 seconds behind. Jack Elackburn was just over 1:40 and Don DeNoon finished a distant fourth...In the AAU 50 Km, Dean Rassmussen, fifth in the above race, overcame extreme heat to win in 5:03:33 followed by Bruce MacDonald, Elliott Derman, Paul Schell, and Goetz Klopfer...The National 30 Km in LA. went to one Ronald Owen Laird in 2:41:17 and in a late news flash, good old Jack Mortland captured the National 10 in Chicago in 48:19 over Art Mark, Don DeNoon, Dean Rassmussen, Ron Daniel, and a sluggish Laird....A few weeks earlier, Mort had succumbed to the heat in an 8 miler. Going through 4 miles in 30:34 he strolled the last 3 as Elackburn won with 63:05 to 68:33. Getting acclimated, he came back a week later to take Elackburn in a 10 miler in 85 degree heat, 78:26 to 80:57. How did I ever do such things?

5 Years Ago (From the June 1970 ORW)—Dapper Dave Rmansky was most of the news with wins in the National 10 and 20, Zinn 10, and American records at 3 km and 2 miles. In the McKeesport 20, Dave pulled clear of Tom Dooley in the final 5 km on the hot blacktop to win in 1:35:35. Dooley did 1:36:04. No one else was close with Ron Kulik, Steve Hayden, Goetz Klopfer, and John Knifton filling out the top six...In the 10, Dave pulled away from Klopfer after a mile on the Chicago Stagg Field Tartan and went on to record a quick 44:22.8. Klopfer had 46:56 with Laird, Mortland, Greg Diebold, and Jerry Bocci following....In the Zinn race the next day on a cinder (would you believe cinder) track, the order was the same, except that Diebold went home and Bob Henderson moved from 7th to 6th. Dave "slowed" to 44:34 and Goetz was closer with 46:27...Manny Agriano edged Mark Achen and Steve Geiver in the National Junior 10 Km as all three recorded 54:02...Ron Kulik did a quick 13:39.8 to beat Ron Daniel by 8 seconds in the Met. AAU 2 Mile...The Canadian 20 Km went to Marcel Jobin in 1:35:42 with Karl Merschens nearly 4 minutes back...Wilf Wesch won the British 20 in 1:31:47, with the first 20 under 1:40...Peter Frenkel did a 1:05:51 for 15 Km on the track in East Germany and edged Hans-Georg Reimann in a Budapest 20 km as both did 1:28:26

FROM HEEL TO TOE

In the National Masters Postal competition for May, Chris Amoroso won the 10 Km in 54:50 with Leonard Bisen 2nd, Howard Barnes 3rd, John Scimone 4th, and John MacLachlan 5th. This was Amoroso's first race of the year in the postal series, now led by Bisen. The June event was 15 Km, July is 5 K, and August 20 Km. Contact Dave Leuthold, 1501 Ross St., Columbia, Mo. 65201 for details on entering....The World Masters is in Toronto in August with 5 and 25 Km walks. If you don't have your entry in, your too late however. The Canadians should put up a strong showing on their home ground with Alex Oakely very tough this year, Felix Cappella appearing to be coming back strongly, and Pat Farrelly reportedly turning 40 just prior to the competition. Max Gould will be most formidable in the 55-59 group. Strongest known overseas competitor to date is England's Roy Thorpe. Of course, Gerhard Weidner is eligible and should he choose to come—forget it. Your editor is entered in the 25 only but is not yet committed to going. I plan to make the National Masters a week earlier and may let it go at that. The U.S. could be very well represented, however, should either Bill Ranney or Rudy Haluza choose to make the scene. The problem I see with these big deal Masters meets is exorbitant entry fees (\$5 per event) and stringent requirements for very early entries. I sort of like to show up at a race and you just can't do that.

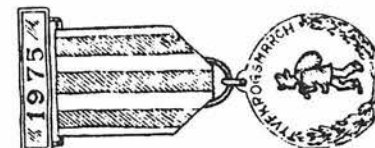

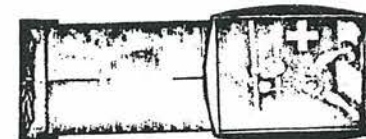
