## KNIFTON CAPUTRES NATIONAL 10

Bridgeport, Conn., July 6—John Knifton pulled away from Dave Romansky and Ron Laird during the second half to win the National AAU Senior 10 Km Race Walk in 45:04 today. The race, held over the parade route in conjunction with the annual P.T. Barnum Festival, was held in near ideal weather considering the time of year. Although the humidity was rather high, the temperature was nearly cool at the start and it was only during the last couple of miles, when the sun peaked out, that it became a bit uncomfortable. Compared to the high temperatures and extremely high humidity that have pervaded the midwest and eastern seaboard this summer, it was well nigh perfect.

The race started and finished on a cinder track, following the streets of Bridgeport through the main business district on an out-and-back course. With the parade to follow immediately after, the course was well lined with spectators, creating a different atmosphere than you find in your standard American walking race.

Knifton, Romansky, and Laird were only a few seconds apart as John made the turn in 22:30, with the rest of the field already stringing out behind. Knifton had too much for Dave, still working toward top condition, on the trip home and Laird, probably regarded as a favorite before the race, faded badly with Ron Daniel coming close to him for third. Bob Kitchen lost out to Daniel and Ron Kulik beat NYAC teammate Ray Somers for sixth, as the AC easily won the team title with four of the first seven. Tom Knatt walked his best short distance, to date to capture 8th, well clear of John Fredericks. Fredericks was overhauled by one Jack Mortland but was too quick the last 440 as he drew back away by 10 seconds or so to take 9th. Mortland had the consolation of being the first Veteran, Master, Senior, or whatever, but only after a real tussle with the amazing 50-year-old Bob Mimm. After being passed at about 2½ miles, the ageless Mimm shot back ahead with about 2 miles to go, throwing real fear into your usually unflappable editor. Fortunately, that was Bob's last gasp, but he was still only 40 seconds back at the finish and is walking nearly as fast as he was 10 to 15 years ago. Or maybe faster over this distance.

The Ohio Track Club made their first team effort in some time and with the comebacking Jack Blackburn in 18th or 19th and Bob Smith in 49th (out of about 75 finishers) captured 7th (ahead of one girl's team and the Shore AC "C"; we weren't quite up to the Shore AC "B" but might get them in the future.) ## SCULLY CAPTURES FIRST NATIONAL TITLE

Long Branch, N.J., July 27—Todd Scully overcame a bid by John Knifton in the final 6 miles to capture the NAAU Senior 40 Km title today. Scully, competing little this year while doing some lonesome training in the Virginia hills, took advantage of another perfect racing day to take better than 4 minutes off Knifton's course record set 2 years ago. Todd finished in 3:25:30.6 as he won his first Senior title.

Todd led most of the race but was overtaken by Knifton at about 15 miles. Four miles later, Todd moved ahead to stay and lengthened his lead to almost 2 minutes at the finish, as John also finished well under his old record. Ron Kulik, Ron Daniel, and Tom Knatt staged a tight race for third and finally finished in that order. Well back of them, Detroit's Bill Walker edged young Bob Rosencrantz, all the way from Seattle, for 6th.

The race also included the National B and National Master's titles. The B race went to Randy Mimm, followed closely by Gary Bywaters and Ray Floriani. Tony Medeiros was an easy winner in the Master's race with Bob Mimm and Jack Boitano taking the next two spots. Tom Dooley, USA 1:41:27—As you may know, this meet was off for a while, because of a TV controversy, and then finally back on just a week before it was to be held. The US track team at that time was scattered all over the world and there was a real scramble to get enough athletes there. Tom Dooley was already in Sweden, thanks to some real effort by Bob Henderson, who should have had the second spot, got back in the country from Germany, where he competed in their 20 Km, just 3 days before the meet and apparently had no luck in trying to get to Kiev for the meet. The AAU apparently made no effort to get a second walker over as John Knifton, the alternate, was not contacted either. Tom was not up to par in the race, but certainly was not helped by the last minute arrangements. The race started and finished on the track with most of it on a 10-lap course up and down some very hilly side streets. A heavy storm, with water up to the ankles in places, did not help the times. Two days later, Tom was in Prague for the US-Poland-Czech meet and found there was a 20 Km walk, after being told repeatedly throughout the trip that none was scheduled. Wisely, he decided not to walk. About all he got out of the trip was some good training with fantastic facilities in Stockholm and a chance to re-new acquaintances with Smaga and Golubnichiy.

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## FROM HEEL TO TOE

Well, we did one of our poorest jobs to date last month in reporting on the 20 and 5 Km nationals. Apparently what we said in describing the races had little resemblance to what actually happened. The 20 Km was very tightly grouped through 10 Km with Brown, Dooley, Henderson, Ranney, Knifton, and Romansky in a pack. Brown moved rather easily ahead at that point and was 50 to 70 yards clear of the rest when pulled by the judges. He was not spurring as we reported. The others remained in a group through 15 Km and it was still anyone's race at that point. In the 5, the pace was not so slow as I had been told. Laird went through the mile in 7:03, Knifton in 7:05, and Walker, Dooley, and Ranney in 7:08. Ranney was a clear third by 7 laps, so Walker did not fall back after a caution at 2 miles as we reported. Bill lost the third spot to Dooley only in the last 60 yards after a caution at 2 miles slowed him somewhat. Although I was given erroneous information from several sources, the fault is mine for not asking someone before the races to provide me with full details immediately. I tend to rely too much on just having people send me things and will have to get a little more aggressive in seeking them. Sorry.... The Pan-Am Trial 20 Km in Eugene shapes up as a real ding-dong race. One can see about 10 guys with a good shot at it and no clear favorite. I suppose Dooley is closest to favorite, since he won the National. But he can't depend on Laird and Brown getting tossed again. Three months ago, Laird would have been a prohibitive favorite but he has lost his competitive spark in the meantime and was certainly not overpowering in the 10, where he finished third. As noted above, the next four in the National behind Dooley, i.e. Henderson, Knifton, Romansky, and Ranney, were all in contention through much of the race but were unable to pull out the necessary finish. Any of the four might do it this time. And then there are three others who weren't even at that race. Todd Scully, with his recent 1:35 plus on the track is certainly a threat. Bob Kitchen hasn't quite gotten it all together yet, but looks menacing. Finally, we don't know just what Larry Young is doing off in Missouri. If he gets to peak fitness, he is going to be a couple of minutes ahead of what anyone else

appears able to do at this time, with the possible exception of the up and down Ron Laird. On the other hand, he has not been in competition, so can't be expected to be that sharp. A very interesting race. If you were expecting this to wind up with some bold predictions you are about to be disappointed....What did Snoopy say in that little cartoon in the May issue. Carl Croneberg, who was born in Sweden interprets it as, "Please receive my heartfelt thanks." Larry Larson, from Racine, known as Little Denmark because it has the largest Danish population of any city its size outside of Denmark, tells me Snoopy says, "Will you take my warmest thanks", which ain't much different. Finally, Gary Bywaters assures me that Charlie Brown has just received a caution from Head Walking Judge Snoopy, which is probably what the others are getting at in some free translation... Larry also points out that Steve Cassarella's reported National High School record is not a record at all. See May 1975 OEW, which reports on the 7:01.9 mile by John VanDenBrandt of Appleton (Wis) East at the Nathan Hale Invitational. Larry was chief judge in this race and was assisted by four others and assures that John's style, much like that of up and coming Jim Heiring, is not at all questionable. Six of 25 starters in the race were disqualified so there was certainly some judging going on....In the Master's Postal Competition for June, Chris Amorose won the 15 Km with 1:26:46. Others were 2. John Scimone 1:31:39 2. Rob Spier 1:33:02 3. George Lundmark 1:33:08 5. Dave Leuthold 1:33:30 5. Leonard Bisen 1:34:27 7. Hank Stephenson 1:49:37 8. William Taft 1:56:44. Bisen now leads the point standings with Spier ahead in the 50-59 class. July's event was 5 Km and for August it is 20 Km. Get information from and send entries to Dave Leuthold, 1501 Ross St., Columbia, Mo. 65201....Starting Line Handbook, which covers age-group listing (for youth, that is) for all events, including the walks, is available from Jim Hanley, 31554 Agoura Rd., #4, Westlake Village, CA 91361 for \$3.00....Haven't got it yet myself but have been told by both Alan Wood and Larry Larson that the book "A Brief History of Race Walking" is a worthwhile purchase. It can be had for \$2.75 from Robert G. Osterhoudt, 14550 Biscayne Way West, Rosemount, Minn. 55068. Mr. Osterhoudt, or rather Dr. Osterhoudt, he has a PhD, is the writer and publisher. He is an Associate Professor of Physical Education at the University of Minnesota. The book is strictly historical with limited details mostly of European walkers and their contributions. I'm going to get a copy. How about you?....While we are boasting other publications, I have recommended it in the past and will say again that Runner's World is very worthwhile for the walker. They do, of course, have the occasional race walking article, but are not worth the price from that standpoint. However, they are geared primarily towards distance running and the training principles are not that much different. They cover all aspects of training and all philosophies. Some things are pretty shallow but others quite meaty. ## LOOKING BACK

10 Years Ago (From the August 1965 OEW--Ron Laird tells me he likes this column because in some recent times it has been the only chance to see his name--he will see it again this month)--Ron Laird and good old Jack Mortland (who relishes this opportunity to print his name) toured



Europe with the US track and field team. Kiev was a bad scene as we were a part of the first losing US team. And in the walk, they threw a long course at us. The Soviet walkers themselves thought it was at least 21 Km and maybe as much as 1600 meters long. In any case, Laird had a pretty good race and Mortland a rotten one, losing contact early and then trudging through by himself on the out and back course through busy streets. 1. Khrolovich 1:39:13.4 2. Agapov 1:39:13.6 3. Laird 1:41:59.4 4. Mortland 1:48:44.6. On to Poland and first a delightful 3 Km on a little cinder track in the midst of a pine forest near the Baltic. This race was not part of the match but rather a race at a local track meet in Sopot. The Poles were having a training camp near by and invited us up to participate in two races since there was no race in the US-Poland meet in Warsaw. The start was fantastic. Placed on the pole, I started out quite smartly, I thought, and suddenly found about 10 Poles in front of me, many of them rather young. I went through the first 440 in 1:38 in 7th place with Laird 1 second and about three places further back. Fortunately, most of these youngsters weren't really capable of that pace and soon fell back and Ron went on to an American record of 12:52.4, but was still 7 seconds back of a fellow name of Czaplinski. The Mort was third in 13:09. Two days later we went 20 Km on the road from Sztum to Malbork, both having good races but this time on a short course. This one wound up Laird 1:29:39.6, Czaplinski 1:32:38.8, Mortland 1:34:38.8. Fourteen minutes off my time in a week. Judging from the splits through 15 Km, which seemed quite all right, it was probably about 600 meters short. The final race was in Augsburg, W.G., a 10 Km on the track with Karl-Heinz Pape beating Laird 45:20.4 to 46:06.2 and Mortland third in 47:57.2, after being cautioned in the first mile.... Paul Schell survived temperatures in the high 90's to win the NAAU 40 Km in Long Branch in 4:17:38 ahead of Ron Kulik, Bruce MacDonald, and John Kelley...On the local scene, which still took much of our editorial space, Blackburn beat Mortland in a pre-European tour 1 Mile on a slow cinder track in Lima 7:04 to 7:07 but the Mort came back 4 days later in an 8 miler, 61:05 to 62:59. With Mortland away, Blackburn turned in an 80:21 10 miler....The issue also included a brief tribute to a good friend and great race walker, who lost his life in Viet Nam that summer, Ron Zinn

5 Years Ago (From the August 1970 ORW)—The US defeated Canada in their first dual meet in Toronto with Ron Laird winning the 20 Km in 1:35:14.2 and Dave Romansky the 20 Mile in 2:37:20.2. Both races were held on the track. John Knifton and Ron Daniel completed a sweep ahead of Marcel Jobin in the 20 Km with Jobin still turning in a good 1:38:21. Both races were held on the track. Romansky was uncontested in the 20 miler and actually bettered Laird's 20 Km on the way with a 1:34:45 but ran into trouble thereafter with no one to push him. Bob Kitchen also put in a good first 20 Km (1:38:20) but when he hit the wall at 15 miles, Casey Alex Oakley came on to beat him by just over a minute with a 2:45:50. Bob Steadman, Bryon Overton, and Pat Farrelly filled out the other spots. Shaul Ladany walked both races as a guest doing 1:42:24 and 2:49:51....It was National 40 Km time again and Dave Romansky beat Ladany by over 2 minutes in 3:32:29. Ron Kulik, Bob Kitchen, Ron Laird, and Ron Daniel followed...Fast improving Bob Henderson captured the National Junior (now B) 2 Mile in a record 14:43.2....East Germany beat the USSR

in a dual meet 23-21. The Soviets won both races, Gennadiy Agapov the 20 in 1:27:30.2 and Benjamin Soldatenko the 50 in 4:06:56.6 but the East German depth paid off as they were 2,3,4 in the 20 and 2,3,5 in the 50. Christoph Hohne was only fifth, but four weeks later beat many of the same people, including Soldatenko, in Czechoslovakia with a 4:06:10.8....In Niles, Ohio, Gary Westerfield won the NAAU Jr. 25 Km in 2:12:28 with Bill "alker 8 minutes back....The Paris-Stasbourg race covered 512 Km this year and was won by Samuel Zaugg in 70:04:50....The West German 50 Km was won by Peter Schuster in 4:06:28.6 with Gerhard Weidner, then just maturing at 37 or so, only 6th. Schuster was a young defector from East German and has dropped completely from the picture apparently. Whatever happened to him?...The West German 20 Km found Bernd Kannenberg only fifth in 1:38 as he was just getting into the sport
