# OHIO RACEWALKER



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## YOUNG, SCULLY TOP PAN-AM 20 KM TRIAL

Eugene, Ore., Aug. 16—Larry Young and Todd Scully, neither of whom even competed in the earlier National 20 Km, walked together all the way in today's Pan-Am 20 Km trial and finished together unchallenged in 1:34:15.6. The judges gave the nod to Young as the two tried to finish in a dead heat. Tom Dooley, first in that National 20 was a spectator today, nursing an injury suffered in a Pre-Olympic 20 Km in Montreal 2 weeks earlier. Another favorite, Bob Henderson, second in the 20, never got going today and finished well back in seventh. Ron Laird, suffering from a hamstring injury went only a half-mile before dropping out. The fourth man who was probably considered among the most serious challengers to the leading duo, Jerry Brown, did stay with them long enough to break away from the rest of the field early and finish an isolated third.

The race was held on the same course as the '72 Olympic Trials, except that the length of the loop was shortened, necessitating an additional lap. The day was overcast, warm, and humid. It was announced before the race that, because of the short time between the Lugano Cup (Oct. 11-12) and the Pan-Am 20 Km (Oct. 15), doubling in the two meets would not be allowed and that the first two finishers would go to the Pan-Am Games. This was also interpreted to mean that the first two would, regardless of how they might finish in the National 50, still have to go to the Pan-Ams. Since many walkers may prefer the Lugano trip, this could have affected race strategy but as the race developed, it did not appear to and it is doubtful if anyone would have been challenging the first two had the choice of trips been open.

By 5 Km, Young and Scully led Brown by one second in 22:49. John Knifton, Bill Ranney, and Wayne Glusker were contesting the next spot, but were already better than a half-minute behind. Strung out behind them were Henderson, Ron Daniel, Bob Kitchen, and Ron Kulik. The only other starter, Ron Laird, was already on the sidelines. The order remained pretty much the same at 10 as Scully led by 2 seconds in 46:07, but Brown was now 36 seconds back and nearly a minute ahead of the following group. Kitchen had moved into seventh but was well over a minute behind Knifton, Ranney, and Glusker and did not appear to be a challenger for the fourth Lugano spot.

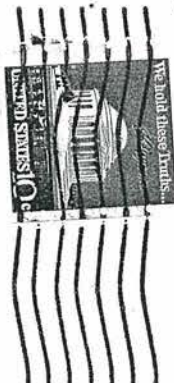
The picture did not change during the next 5, except that Brown lost a little ground to the trio behind him and Ranney had dropped a little behind Knifton and Glusker but was still well clear of Kitchen. However, Bob was walking closest to even pace of anyone in the race and caught Glusker to finish fifth, as Ranney was pulled by the judges in the last 2 Km. Bob was only 15 seconds back of Knifton at the end

and John had closed to within 17 seconds of Brown. (Rechecking the notes I have, I see Ranney was actually DQ'd just about a half-mile from the finish after repassing Glusker and appearing to have the fourth Lugano spot.)

Thorpe had the field completely outclassed, having walked International for England this year and having done a 1:31 plus for 20 Km. Norm Read, the 1956 Olympic 50 Km winner, is still very fit. With 1A and 1B walking together, Kelly got third overall and was the first American. Boitano was moving to challenge him when he was cautioned with a half-mile to go. As a result, Irwin made a move at him the final lap, just as Mortland got untracked at last and though he might catch Irwin. Sixth, I now recall, in the 1A class was Englishman Frank Turner in just over 25. In 2A, Bob Mimm opened up an early 70-80 meter lead but was then nearly caught by the stylish McMullin before opening up again on the final lap. Our own Clair Duckham, in his first National Masters competition, stayed ahead of veteran Larry O'Neil throughout to take the title. He was, of course, very hard to live with the rest of the weekend, particularly in light of my poor fifth place, and reportedly upon returning home found that none of his jaunty little berets fit him anymore. 20 Km, Aug. 15: (Overall result shown, with Class in parenthesis)—1. to a mile. Thorpe moved right to the front and was never challenged and probably walked just hard enough to win. Mortland and Kelly were together from about 3 miles on and finally decided to come in together since they were in different classes. The best race of the day was O'Neil-Duckham in 3B. They walked together the whole way until Duckham spurred with about 440 to go. At first it looked like he had Larry's number again, but after Clair got a quick 5 yards Larry responded and held him until they hit the track with 150 yards to go. Larry then pulled out a kick of his own to which the disappointed Duckham had no answer. Next year, Clair will graduate to the 70 year olds and will have Larry out of his hair for a few years. Bruce MacDonald did not compete, opting for the 400 meter hurdles instead. As a matter of fact, 30 seconds after I finished, he thrust a clipboard and stopwatch into my hand and told me to record the finishers while he ran off for his heat of the race.

Division 4 went to Alf Roberts of England—There was also a 5 Km three days earlier but it developed into rather a fiasco. The first heat (Divisions 2B and up) went off all right, but I don't have the results except that Max Gould came first. However, when heavy rains struck before the second heat and destroyed many contestants' numbers and when assigned officials did not show up for the start, which had been moved up from the original schedule, the second heat became a disaster. Lap counting was completely fouled up and the race was finally declared void, although medals had been given out, in many cases to the wrong individuals. Roy Thorpe was first, but walked a lap short. Alex Oakley was first in 1B. Jack Boitano did 23:58 and John Kelly was about 25 seconds ahead of him, but was stopped a lap short. Bob Mumm was in the first three in 2A but wasn't listed in the original, and later voided, results. Those that were upset with the organization at White Plains probably wished they were back there.

#### KANNENBERG WINS PRE-OLYMPIC 20 KILOMETER

Montreal, Aug. 3—Bernd Kannenberg outlasted a classy international on a hot, humid day to win the 20 Km walk at the Pre-Olympic Meet in a slowish 1:35:44.2. The heat took a high toll, apparently right from the start. Hans-Georg Reimann went through the first 5 Km in a pedestrian, for him, 23:10 and was 37 seconds ahead of second place Bob Henderson with Vittorio Visini and Kannenberg right on Bob's heels. Reimann slowed markedly the next 5 but still had 20 seconds on Kannenberg as he passed the half-way mark in 47:29. Henderson was fourth behind Visini in 48:35 at this point but dropped out soon after. Kannenberg was in command by 15 Km in 1:11:56 with Frances Gerard LeLievre now second in 1:12:31, one second ahead of the faltering Reimann. Visini had faded badly during this stretch and was 80 seconds back of these two and barely ahead of Gerhard Weidner. ## FROM HEEL TO TOE

The 1976 U.S. Olympic Trials will be back in Eugene starting June 17. The 20 Km Walk will be held on Saturday. The Olympic course in Montreal will leave the Stadium, go up a hill for about 9 miles on a flat park course, and then go back down the hill for a finish in the Stadium. The Eugene course will attempt to simulate this so the course used for the '72 Trials will not be used this time. Rather the race will leave the Stadium, go up a hill and immediately back down to the Stadium for about 9 miles on the track in front of the crowd. The track is being used because there is no good flat loop available and so that the walk can be held in front of the crowd. As it now stands, up to 12 walkers will be invited to the tryouts with expenses paid. The qualifying standard has been set at 1:35 but it is anticipated that as many as 12 will not attain this standard and others will be invited. Not only fast times but consistency of performance will be considered in these additional invitations. Qualifying times must be on a recognized or certified course, or on the track. It has not been announced from what date times will be accepted. Perhaps Larry Young, Todd Scully, and Jerry Brown are already qualified. Thanks to Bruce MacDonald for the above information.....The National Masters Postal competition for July was at 5 Km and with the AAU Masters Race in White Plains (actually held in August) there was a record field of 28. The first five places, Kelly, Boitano, Mortland, Mimm, and Gray, came from that race with Chris Amoroso the first to crack that group with his 26:40. Leonard Busen now leads the overall standings with 42 points to Amoroso's 39. Events for September are 100 Km and 100 Miles and for October 30 Km. Entries to Dave Leuthold, 1501 Ross Street, Columbia, Mo. 65201....Well, the Ohio Race-walker is out of the free advertising business after the reaction we got to the plug for Tiger shoes a few issues back. Larry Larson, who had sent me the information got the following "Speed Message" from John Bork of Tiger's Garden Grove, Cal. office: "Recently we sent you a pair of walking shoes to you in return for your payment of \$16.00 to Gurley-Bates Company. Because the walking shoes are not available for sale in the U.S. we did this for you as a personal courtesy not as a means of developing sales from this office. This office is involved in promotion primarily with all sales being handled by retailers through our U.S. distributors. We do not have the staff necessary to process mail orders, not having a secretary or clerical help, nor, resale license. Therefore, we were somewhat concerned that a note was placed in the Ohio and/or Wisconsin Race Walker publications giving us as a source of these walking shoes. We have gotten 5-6 requests (Yes, Virginia. People do read the Ohio Racewalker!) to date for the shoes which we must return to the senders. If you placed the notice in the publication could you please be sure not to do so again. This will avoid inconvenience to this office and to the walkers who send us requests. Meanwhile, we will try to locate a retailer who will be willing to sell the shoes to walkers via mail orders." Sorry we inconvenienced some of you by leading you to believe that Tiger is interested in selling shoes. Say, I'll let Hush Puppies has never refused to sell to Todd Scully....In that US-WG 10 Km in Durham in which John Knifton finished close to Bernd Kannenberg in high heat, John led for a while and had the following splits--7:09.5, 14:29, 22:01, 29:56.5, 38:05, 46:07. Bob Henderson was ahead of John for 3/4 and went through the mile in 7:12 but then ran out of gas in the heat and slowed to 15:02, 23:19, 32:10, 40:52, and 49:22. According to Kannenberg's coach, he has never received a caution in his career and he looked as smooth as usual in this race....Am still waiting to receive

a copy of the Osterhoudt book on the history of race walking, which we mentioned last month. However, I do now have an outline, which looks very detailed covering the British, Lerner to Nihill; George Goulding; Early German Presence; The Italians, Altmani to Pamich; The Swiss Duo, Schwab and son; the Norwegian Edgur Bruun; the Swedes Mikaelsson, Hardmo, Ljunggren, et al; The Eastern European Revolution, Non European Contributions; East Germany Hegemony; and Other Influences. However, when one considers the book is only 38 pages long, how much detail can actually be there. Nonetheless, I sent my \$2.50 to Robert G. Osterhoudt, 14550 Biscayne Way West, Rosemount, MN 55068....It seems that the 5 Km was not the only mixup at the World Masters Meet. In the 25, the official results were still not available at the banquet the night of the race and many athletes went home the next day without medals. Yet, the Marathon results, with more than 400 competitors, were available within 2 hours after that race. Besides that, I hear that the banquet meal was quite meager; not even enough to satisfy skinny Bob Mimm. All this comes from Bob, who had a few other complaints about the organization as well; but lest our Canadian friends take offense, Bob prefaced his remarks by saying the meet was great. Organization was rather lacking at White Plains, too, and I am sure that overseas competitors returned home after the two meets totally unimpressed with the way meets are managed on the North American continent....At least one competitor from overseas was unimpressed with judging in this country, as well. At White Plains, I stood by the track with Frank Turner, from England, during the second heat of the 5 Km (ages 50 and up). Even before the race, he expressed disillusionment with the system of cautions, stating that in England you do not get a caution. More on that later. Then during the race he pointed out several individuals that he felt would have been pulled quickly in England. At least according to this one individual, judging is much stricter over there. Now back to the caution bit. What actually is a caution. I think Frank was interpreting it as a warning given when a walker is not progressing within the rules that he will be disqualified if he does not straighten up. Maybe many people in this country, including judges, interpret it that way too. I don't, but as I discussed a few years ago, I really don't know how to interpret the rule as it reads. No one has straightened me out in the meantime. Let us look at Rule 191, Walking, from the IAAF Handbook. Paragraph 2 (which follows a definition of what constitutes legal walking) states: ".....When in the opinion of.....a competitor's mode of progression fails to comply with the definition during any part of the competition, he shall be disqualified." That is quite clear. If your not walking legally, you are out. No warnings, cautions or whatever. Paragraph 4 then states: "A competitor may be cautioned when by his mode of progression he is in danger of ceasing to comply with the definition of contact; but he is not entitled to a second caution." Interpreting the second part of that is what throws me. As people interpret it in this country, if you are cautioned twice, you are disqualified. Yet how can you be disqualified for being in danger of ceasing to comply with the definition if you are still doing so. I think the problem comes from people interpreting a caution as arising from failing to comply with the rules. Not so. If you fail to comply you should be tossed pronto; no caution or anything. I'm not sure why they put that second caution kicker in the rule. If you are cautioned and you want to play it risky, you should be able to continue without change of style; i.e. walk the entire race "in danger" so long as you do actually maintain contact. I see that rule as meaning only that the judges are not to tell you again about your jeopardy. But if one does by mistake, the walker certainly should not be disqualified so long as he is only in



danger of losing contact and not actually doing so. Anyway, the rules are quite clear to me, except for that bit about a second caution, but I don't know if anyone else reads them like I do. If at anytime during the race, your mode of progression does not conform to the definition of walking, you are out. Period. If you are tending toward breaking contact, although still in contact, the judges may caution you once about the danger. They then say nothing else to you unless you cease to walk legally, at which point they disqualify you, which would have happened with or without the caution. The caution is merely a courtesy to the walker to let him know that his mode of progression bears close scrutiny. I would be interested in knowing how others are presently interpreting the rules, including judges....

*it has absolutely no bearing on disqualification.*

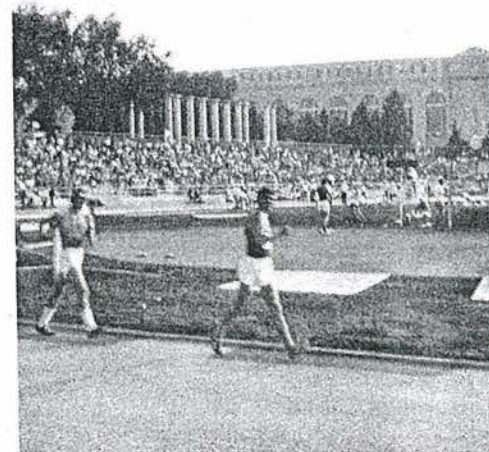
10 Years Ago (From the July 1965 ORW)—Ron Laird won the NAAU 20 Km in Baltimore in 1:38:37.9 over Jack Mortland, Dean Rasmussen, Don DeNoon, and a surprising Regis Dandar. Laird led from the start and was never seriously challenged.... This was a big improvement over Ron's miserable 6th place finish in 50:00 a few weeks earlier in the National 10. The Mort won that one in 48:19.5 over Art Mark, DeNoon, Rasmussen, and Ron Daniel.... Bob Brewer beat the OTC's Chuck Newell to win the National Jv 30 Km in Columbia in 3:04:22.7.... Laird was also an easy winner in the National 2 Mile leaving Daniel 27 seconds back with his 14:04.2.

DeNoon and Rudy Haluza followed.... The National Junior 1 Hour went to George Shilling with Newell fourth this time

5 Years Ago (From the July 1970 ORW)—In Erfurt, E.G., Peter Frenkel shattered the World's 20 Km record with a 1:25:50 on the track. Hans-George Reimann and Gerhard Sperling finished 74 seconds back—In the US-USSR dual meet in Leningrad, Dave Romansky walked a fine 1:29:50 but still finished behind three Soviets. Dave had earlier walked a 1:31:56 on the track in Paris, with Tom Dooley returning 1:34:54.4, and a 43:03.8 10 Km in Stuttgart. Dooley had 44:28.6 in that one and a good 1:32:31 in Leningrad.... Earlier, Dooley had left bridesmaid Ron Daniel 30 seconds back in winning the National 2 Mile in 13:44.... John Kelly won two firsts at the 3rd US Master's meet with a 7:12.5 mile and a 1:42:55 for 20 Km.. In Junior Nationals, Steve Geiver did 1:21:47 to beat Olympic runner Jerry Lindgren in the 15 and Bruce Adair covered 7 miles 100 yards to win the 1 Hour.... On the Ohio scene, we were engaged in our second annual Tour of Ohio series. Paul Reback beat Mortland by 7 seconds in a Dayton 15 Km event with 1:16:04, Bill Walker won a Van Wert 10 miler in 1:21:24 and Mortland won a rather long 7½ Km in Columbus in 38:15....
