NATIONAL T&F CHAMPIONSHIPS BRING LITTLE SURPRISE; LEWIS AND TORRELLAS TOP FIELDS

Tampa, Florida, June 18-Yesterday, Maryanne Torrellas successfully defended her national title at 10 Km, winning in 48:25.3. It was her third title in the last four years. This morning, Tim Lewis won his fourth title in a row at 20 Km. Despite a time of 1:29:34, rather pedestrian for Tim, he won by nearly 3 minutes over Ray Sharp. Times in both races were significantly affected by the heat and humidity.

The 29-year-old Torrellas, mother of two, moved out from the start with TeresaVaill. by the end of 4 laps on the track, the duo had 15 seconds on the field. Vaill led past 5 Km, but Torrellas then took the lead for good. Vaill hung doggedly a step back through about 7500 meters and then gave ground only gudgingly, finishing just 7 seconds back.

In third was sensational newcomer, Wendy Sharp, the only one in the rest of the field to escape being lapped by the front two. Reportedly walking for just 10 weeks, Wendy already has a 49:30 under her belt and survived well in the heat here. Probably receives some assistance from husband Ray.

Vaill, ranked number in this event in 1986, but a disappointing four last year, came back strongly in this one to push the 5-5, 120 pound Torrellas to the finish. The 25-year-old Vaill has won 10 N tional titles at other distances, but has never managed to win this one.

In the 20, TimLewis had the race pretty much his own way. Sharp was challenged by Steve Pecinivsky for the first 10 Km, with Andy Kaestner and Marco Evoniuk a short distance back. However, Pecinivsky faded the second half, and Kaestner, with another impressive performance, was able to pull clear of Evoniuk.

Neither race drew a large field and there were actually more times as inspectors than racewalkers on the course during both races.

Well, hold your noses! Another band of renegades with time hanging heavy on their hands has emerged. The Guano Press has been resurrected, rising not from sewers and gutters of the Eastern seaborad, but from the supposedly clean, pure mountain air of Colorado. Ah, but the stench certainly belies the pristine origins. Volume Iof Race Tight Press (formerly Guano Press) has reached us from Colorado Springs, home of the U.S. Olympic Training Center and some of our nation's top walkers. The staff remains anonymous--unless you want to accept such names as Human Smurf, Gumby, Mr. Potatoe (sic) Head, and the Fly (alias Hymeto).

But obviously, this vituperative rag is the handiwork of walkers in residence at the Center. . . Regarding the rankings I ran from the Danish magazine Gangsport last month (you'll recall I couldn't interpret the accompanying explanation), Gayle Johnson, from here in Columbus, sent the following note (rather left it on my car one evening as I was working out): "Dr. Bach-Nielsen says that the lists are a vote of the best racewalkers for the two distances over the 75 year history and that the brief paragraphs below each list represent the author's personal £avorites. Who voted, or how, or on what criteria remains unstated. Criteria for choosing Dr. Bach-Nielson were: a. his name B. he speaks with a Danish accent c. he comes from Copenhagen d. he smokes a pipe e. more than one of the above answers is correct f. proximity" . . . Further explanation comes from Helene Britton, in far off New York, who had an IAAF publication which carried similar lists for all T&F events. From that document: "....the International Athletic Foundation Council proposed a vote among the Abhletics family to find the top ten athletes in each standard event of the past 75 years. A list of 1000 voters was drawn up, consisting of IAAF C uncil members, member federations, athletes, press, television, statisticians, etc. This vote is in no way an official definitive list. Its intention was to reflect the glorious heritage of the past 75 years and recall its greatest names. It is hoped that this list will not end the debate, but in fact stimulate more discussion. It is satisfying to note that the passage of time cannot dim the memory of the great athletes past, and the sport must do everything to maintain such recognition among its future fans." . . . Henry Laskau was agian by-passed in the vote for new members of the Track and Field Hall of Fame. Those named from the list of 11 candidates were Greg Bell, long jumper; Cordner Nelson, founder of T&F News; Martin Sheridan, weight man; and Barbara Ferrell, sprinter. . . Julie Morrison, editor of Running Journal, has published a booklet on race walking (14 pages of text, that touches briefly on all aspects. OLYMPIC 20 KM TRIALS

Racewalking returns to Indianapolis on July 16 to select three men to compete at 20 Km in the Seoul Olympics. At the same venue in April, Carl Schueler, Marco Evoniuk, and Andy Kaestner qualified at 50 km. All three have also met the qualifying standard at 20, but their at this time are not known to your editor.

The only sure thing about these trials, at least from this corner, is that, barring a broken leg or something equally disastrous between now

and the 16th, Tim Lewis will be on the team--no doubt leading the way. Tis is simply a head above anyone else at this distance right now, he doesn't have bad races when it counts, and if he gets DQd the rest of the field should already have gone that route. Se we know who one of our representatives will be.

The other two spots? If Carl Schueler chooses to double, he is probably a good bet, consistently our number two man at the distant in recent times. Assuming Carl is concentrating only on the 50, we look to Ray Sharp. He should make it, but consistency has never been his strong point. Paul Schwartzburg is certainly a contender. He had a 1:26:39 back in March, a recent record at 15 Km, and the experience of last year's World Dup participation. He could easily come second in the trail regardless of who else is there and how well they are walking. Our premier walker at the distance in the early '80s was Jim Heiring, a member of both the 1980 and 1984 Olympic Teams at 20. Slowed somewhat by injuries in recent years, he has concentrated more on 50. However, his recent 1:28:36 shows he is ready to make a serious bid to win the spot he just missed at 50 (fourth place). Gary Morgan has become very consistent in the 1:27 range and is determined to make this his big year. The great veteran, Dan O'Connor, also disappointed at 50, broke 1:28 recently to announce that he is still a strong contender at 20. Mike Stauch and Paul Wick are capable of beating any of these guys, and, of course, so is Marco Evoniuk, if he chooses to double.

Obviously, we can expect to see a terrific race. The final slot on the team could easily come down to a five or six man race over the last kilometer. Tim Lewis won't be involved in that, but all the others mentioned above could be. If I have to go out on a limb, I'll say Lewis, Sharp, Schwartzberg. I guess the only surprises to me, though, will be if Tim Lewis does not make it, or if anyone outside those

On the evening before the Trial, the women will have an invitational 10 Km, looking toward the hoped for inclusion of the event in the 1992 Olympics. Originally, a qualifying time of 52:00 had been set for the event. Now they plan to invite the top 15, which, as of June 15, includes two who have not hit 52:00. The top 20 at that date were: Maryanne Torrellas, 46:28 (the qualifying period began April 21, 1987), Teresa Vaill 46:50, Lynn Weik 46:51, Lisa Vaill 47:32, Debbie Lawrence 48:23, Sara Standley 49:00, Dee Collier 49:08, Victoria Herazzo 49:16, Wendy Sharp 49:30, Mary Howell 50:10, Carol Brown 50:54, Esther Lopez 51:47, Karen Rezach 51:55, Sasan Travellin 52:21, Dorit Attias 52:27, Viisha Sedlak 52:48, Kim Wilkinson 52:51, Nora Comans 53:31, Sybil Perez 53:45, and Sue Klappa 55:03. 25 Years Ago (Fromthe June 1963 Race Walker, edited by Chris McCarthy)--The National 50 Km, held in Detroit, went to that same editor, Chris McCarthy, in 4:44:55, nearly lOminutes ahead of Ron Laird. Alex Oakley dropped out at about 23 miles at 23 miles, as the temperature soared to 87 F. The OTC's Jack Blackburn was a distant third. . . Oakley won the Canadian 20 Km in 1:34:44. . . In the US-USSR match in Moscow, Gennadiy Solodov ignored temperatures in the mid-80s to win in 1:33:45, with Vladimir Zorin second in 1:35.06. Ron Zinn and Ron Laird went through 15 Km in about 1:12, but then faded badly to 1:41:34 and 1:42:24. . .

Jack Blackburn continued his sprint mastery over Jack Mortland, winning the Ohio I Mile title in 6:55.5. Blackburn also had a 39:13 for 5 miles and a 31:11 for 4 mileswhile Mortland was off honeymooning.

20 Years ago (From the June 1968 ORW) -- Paul Nihill held off the challenge of two Americans to win the British 20 Mile title in 2:35:07. Larry Youn, was second in 2:37:04 and Don DeNoon just behind Shaun Lightman in fourth with 2 39:50. . . DeNoon recorded a fast 3 Km 2 weeks later incapturing the National AAU title in 12:37.9. Ron Laird was second in 12:40.6, Larry Young third in 12:49.4, and Tom Dooley fourth in 12:57.4. . . In a Philade phia 30 Km race, Dave Roamsnky recorded 2:28:46 to easily beat Bob Kticher (2:33:32). . .

15 Years Ago (From the June 1973 ORW) -- The National 3 mile title went to John Knifton in 21:36.4 while Jerry Brown won at 15 Km in 1:12:26. Ron Laird (21:45) and Bill Ranney (21:49) trailed Knifton in the Bakersfield heat, and Laird was also second in the 15 (1:14:22), contested in the altitude at Boulder. .. Randy Mimm won the Jun or 10 Km in51:45. Mimm qualified to compete against the Soviet juniors and thus became the first son of an international walker-(Bob, 1960 Olympics) to gain international status. . . Ron Laird won the Z.nn Memorial 10 Km in CHicago with a 46:23. The women's title went to Jeanne Bocci in 54:29. . . East Germany won both races in an International match with Italy, France, and Sweden, Karl-Hein: Stadtmueller doing 1:27:38 and Peter Selzer 4:02:35. . . West Germany's BErnd Kannenberg beat the Soviets in a dual meet with a 1:27:19 for 20. .

10 Years Ago (From the June 1978 ORW)--Augie Hirt moved through 100 Km in 10:19:00 to win the National title in Lafayette, Colorado. Allen Price was second in 1:51:46. . . There were four races at the National T&F Meet that year. Susan Liers won the Women's 5 Km in 25:46, well clear of SueBrodock and Chris Shea. Brodock came back to win the 10 Km in 52:18, with Paula Kash-Mori, fourth at 5, beating Liers 53:01 to 52:29. L.z Dufour was a second back of Liers. John Berendt won the men's 5 Km in 22:31.6, just ahead of Carl Schueler and Wayne Glusker. Marco Etoniuk was fourth. In the 20, Todd Scully moved well clear over the second half to win in 1:34:46. Larry Walker had 1:35:27, Dan 0'Connor 1:36:20, Tom Dooley 1:37:08, and Evoniuk 1:38:38.. . The Mexicans cleaned up in Euripe. Raul Gonzalez set a world's record on the track in Norway with 3:52:24, and Daniel Bautista had 20 Km wins in Norway (1:25:10), Madrid (1:23:28), and Sweden 1:25:54, beating most of the best Europeans in the process. . . England's Derek Harrison broke the wolrd mark for 24 hours, going 219.5 Km.

5 Years Ago (Fromthe June 1983 ORW)--At the Athletics Congress Outdoor Championships, Jim Heiring and Susan Liers-Westerfield both won their third straight title. Susan controlled the 10 K_{m} race all the wayto win in 50:58. Debbie Lawrence was 42 seconds back, with Sam Miller third in 52:50. Surprising newcomer, Maryanne Torrellas, was just 2 seconds behind Miller at the finish. Heiring was also in full control at 20 (Both races were on the track) as he won in 1:26:55. Marco Evoniuk trailed by 50 seconds and Dan O'Connor took third in 1:29:38. Tim Lewis started the final 400 meters 11 seconds back of Todd Scully, but stormed through that final lap to overhaul the veteran (1:30:18 to 1:30:23) for the fourth spot on the U.S. World Compas team. . . The annual races in Naumburg, GDR went to Soviet Nikolai Polozov (1:22:37) and Ronald Weigel (3:41:31) of the host country. . . Raul Gonzalez walked two 50 Km races in just 3 weeks--3:5151 in Mexico and 3:51:37 inChzechoslavakia. .. Susan Liers-Westerfield also won the National 5 Km on Long I land in 24:41.6.
