OLYMPICS DETERMINE MEN'S RANKINGS; SOVIET WOMEN DOMINATE

The ORW's annual rankings of the world's walkers (and the top U.S. walkers) is usually a rather exciting task. But in 1988, the men's ranking are determined almost entirely by the finishing order at the Seoul Olympics. Everyone concentrated on those two races and the top men had little other competition against one another. On the women's side, there were no significant International races. As a result, the Soviet women completely dominate the rankings based on their multiple fast races. The U.S. rankings are little less cut and dried.

The ORW launched its World Rankings for men at 20 and 50 Km in 1971 and added U.S. rankings at the same two distances 2 years later. This marks the tenth year we have ranked the women at 10 Km, both world and U.S. We weren't omitting women before that time because of sexism--the ORW has always covered women's results--but simply because there wasn't enough activity to justify rankings.

These rankings are strictly a subjective judgment on the part of your editor as to who were the top 10 walkers in each event for 1988. For each distance, a list of the fastest performers for the year follows the rankings. The fastest aint necessarily the best. For the rankings, we consider performance in major competitions and records in head-to-head competition aginst other top performers, as well as times. No awards to the top rankers other than the plaudits of hundreds of ORW readers. So, on to the rankings.



PAN AMERICAN CUP--1988

Mar del Plata, Argentina, Nov. 12-13--The third edition of the Pan Am Cup saw three different nations on top in the three races--the Canadians in the women's 10 Km, the U.S. men in the 20 Km, and the Mexican men in the 50.

In the womne's 10 Km, Canada's tough veteran internationalist, Ann Peel broke away in the final stages to score a clear and well deserved win in 46:23. Mexico's Maria Colin was a game second, just ahead of Teresa Vaill. But Teresa was disqualified moving Debbie Lawrence to third in a brilliant personal best of 46:44. Canada would have won the team title even without Vaill's DQ as Janice McCaffrey and Alison Baker finished fourth and fifth. Maryane Torrellas had an off day and faded to eighth in 49:02 after being with the leaders at the halfway point.

The 20 Km was an easy win for last year's World Cup winner, Carlos Mercenario. His Mexican teammate, 1984 Olympic Champion Ernesto Canto, challenged him for 15 Km, but gave up the chase rather than risk a third red card. He is close to making a habit of disqualifications and didn't want to continue. Tim Lewis led the U.S. effort with a fourth place finish behind Canada's Guillaume Lablanc. Gary Morgan had a bad day, finishing 13th, but the U.S. got the team victory when Mexico had its third and fourth walkers disqualified.

The 50 was an easy win for Mexico as they swept the first three spots. Herm Nelson and Paul Wick led the U.S. effort in fifth and sixth places. The results: Women's 10 Km--1. The only change I make from the Olympic order of finish will probably not please our Northern neighbors and faithful subscriber Guillaume Leblanc, who was 10th in the Games, coming through brilliantly in a major race as he has so often. However, Guillaume was only 12th in an April race in Spain and was easily beaten by Mercenario and Canto in the PanAm Cup, while Pershin had two very fast wins, one on the track and one against other very strong Soviets. Beyond that, no one seemed to have done either bad enough or good enough outside the Olympic arena to justify altering the finish there.

Elliott assures that this is an "important stuff" question, not a trivia question. . . Bob Bowman sought an explanation from the Soviets as to why they left proven veterans off their Olympic team (Mostovik in the 20 and Suntsov and Perlov in the 50), but got none. . . Regarding the photo on page 2 that shows an Olympic 50 Km walker clearly off the ground: So what? A recent issue of Monterey Peninsula's Walk Walk Club newsletter ran a picture taken from the British Race Walking Record showing Britain's Chris Maddocks off the ground in the Olympic 20. They were aghast. But, we have had many such pictures in the past and reams of comments on such issues. From our viewpoint, and we have said it before when the judging issue gets real hot, the question is not how a photo looks, but how the walker looked to the judges at the time. We've proven time and again that the eye cannot actually detect lack of contact, but must rely on a bunch of subjective factors. Again, the answer to the problem is to simply insert the phrase "as seen by the naked eye" into the rules and photos can do nothing to embarrass our sport. It's been suggested many times by many people, but hasn't happened yet, but obviously, that has always been the implication of the rule. . . There has been commentary in these pages and elsewhere since the Olympics about the state of U.S. walking. To the Editor:

All the screaming about NBC-TV's non-coverage of the Olympic race walks was predictable long before. TGhe RW world really should have bombarded NBC long before the Games. A lobbying campaign well before Seoul might have helped. But yelling afterward is simply after the fact.

Now that NBC has won the 1992 rights, it should be important to start the '92 lobbying campaign right now. Tell 'em why the walks deserve to be seen. Other events were discriminated against, too. No wonder the fencers made that rumpus at Opening Ceremonies.

Furthermore: Now that cable will pick up some '92 events, let's see if this will help RW's chances of being seen.

Also: The 1989 World Cup of RW from Spain is listed as an event on "The American Plan" for TV coverage next May. Let's really get on to TBS and make sure that first class coverage is really achieved and that the Cup is not somehow left out when it comes time to determine what American audiences get to see. Let's also work on TBS to make sure the waoks are included in their coverage of the 1990 Goodwill Games.

We have a lot more ammunition now-what with the sales of walking shoes going out of sight, what with general interest in walking soaring, what with the women's 10 Km now an Olympic event, thus giving walking status as 1/14 or 3/42, or 7.14 percent of all Olympic track and field.

As to Bob Costas's remarks, they were simply one more example of a man's basic ignorance of track and field.

I was out on the road course for both races at Seoul. There was polite enthusiasm for both, and good-sized crowds over the 2500 m loop. If the Korean walkers had been among the leaders, these fans would have gone wild. The loop was set up along the city's most heavily traveled roads, just outside the Olympic Sports Complex. Traffic was tied up something terrific. But Seoul drivers bore with it nobly, in the great Olympic spirit.

Finally, if race walking ever does become a TV sport, let's all make sure it's positively. In other words: judges toughen up, walkers stay legal. We have the potential for some embarrassment.
