SHARP BEATS HEIRING, RECORD IN FAST MILLROSE RACE

New York, Jan. 28--Ray Sharp overcame a lost shoe early in the race to sweep by Jim Heiring late in the race and capture the 1 Mile walk at the Millrose Games in a world's best time. Ray's 5:46.21 bettered the old mark of 5:47.39 by Heiring set at Richfield last February. Heiring was also under his old record with 5:47.3. Tim Lewis was also under 5:50, Tom Edwards under 6:00, three others under 6:10, and two more under 6:20 in by far the fastest mass finish in indoor history.

Sharp had his heel stepped on early in the race, and as he paused to replace his shoe the whole field went by. Heiring took command and led practically the whole race, but Sharp was able to pick his way through the field and collar Heiring on the final lap. Aging Todd Scully, who set a then world's best of 6:55 in this race 4 years ago, was not that much slower with his 6:13.8 tonight--but there were seven walkers in front of him.

There were 58 members and guests in attendance at the meeting, which I should think is far and away a record.

In addition, Kitchen will appoint special race walking subcommittees on Marketing and Media and Sports Medicine to work with the representatives from the Race Walking Committee to those TAC committees.

Important rules items acted on were addition of a 10 Km walk to the Women's Outdoor T&F Championships and a move to withdraw the 100 miles and 2 hour walks from Senior championships, which was withdrawn without vote.

The Committee has a budget of \$56,000 for 1983, up from \$25,000 last year, which has been allocated as follows:

Gary Westerfield, Ron Daniel, Bob Bowman, Dean Ingram, Susan Liers-Westerfield, and Wayne Glusker were asked to serve as a subcommittee to study the whole issue of women's funding following a discussion concerning equal funding for men's and women's race walking.

Sal Corrallo announced that for the 1983 National Sports Festival, team selection (teams including two competitors in each event for geographic areas of the country) will be based on the athlete's residence on April 1. Athletes at the US Olympic Training Center will be considered residents of their home area. The 1983 Festival will be at Colorado Springs.

Qualifying standards for the Outdoor T&F Championships were set at 1:38:00 for 20 Km, 54:00 for the Junior 10 Km, 57:00 for the women's 10 Km, 27:30 for

the women's 5 km, and 17:30 for the junior women's 3 km. For next year's Olympic Trials, full expenses will be paid for those under 1:33:00 in the 20 and 4:30:00 in the 50. In both cases, if 15 walkers don't make the standard, the next fastest walkers will be added up to 15.

FROM HEEL TO TOE

The ORW has yet to achieve perfection, and this year in our lists and rankings was no exception. Here are additions and corrections that have been brought to our attention to date. In the women's 10 Km, Chris Anderson had a best of 55:14, not 57:10, a time that had been reported in the ORW and we managed to miss in compiling the lists. In the same event, Dorothy Kelley had a best of 55:31, not 58:29. This was in a race we had not received results on. In the women's 5 Km, Carol Brown, who we had down for a best of 27:07, did 25:50 in an Empire Games Trial. She also had what may have been a faster time than that in the Empire Games themselves, but unfortunately that race was on a short course, so I could not consider it for the lists. Her time there was 24:11 in fourth, which I have been told "converts" to 25:10. However the race was reported at the time as being 1123 yards short, which is 374 yards 1 foot and she could not cover that in a minute. I think based on that, a "conversion" would be much closer to 26 minutes. In any case, the two times make her a candidate for the rankings. Debbie Spino, in eighth, beat her in the National meet, so she won't displace Debbie. And since Dorothy Kelley beat her clearly (23:38) in that short Empire Games race, Dorothy will rank ahead of her. So if any change is made, it would be to displace Jeanne Bocci and Lori Maynard (9th and 10th) with Dorothy and Carol. Since I can't reprint the December issue, I'll let each of you decide where you want to rank them and simply say they are tightly bunched. In retrospect, I had to throw out the Empire Games so far as the lists went, but probably should have considered it for the rankings. As to Carol's Empire trials race, I can only consider races for which I have results and I never received anything on that one. On the World 50 Km list, I somehow managed to credit Guillaume Leblanc with Francois LaPointe's 3:51:38. My apologies to Francois. Also in the world lists, Gillian Grant's 23:52 should be 23:51.7t, add Nancy Sweazey, Can. to the 5 Km list with 24:17.6, and add Canada's Mandy Holland (52:17) to the 10 km list. Allison Baker's best was 52:22, not 52:16. In the U.S. 50 Km list, Brian Savilonis went on to a 4:42:12 clocking after finishing the National 40 Km, which is certainly a legitimate performance, but I'm not sure it should be on the list since it wasn't an actual race (at 50, that is). There seems to be some controversy surrounding the 4:36:24 by Bill Ranney in the Pacific Association Championships, which was reported in these pages. Subsequent to that report, I was informed by a usually reliable source that this was not a legitimate race. Not having been there, which usually reliable source do I believe? . . . Bev LaVeck's 100 mile performance got her into Sports Illustrated's Faces in the Crowd feature. . . My wife recently caught Howie Jacobson, Dorothy Kelley, add another lady on a segment of Sports Women on ESPN, which ran for about 3½ minutes. . . For your anecdotes' file, Seattle's Susan "Sam" Miller reports: "I was walking to Greenlake in Seattle one afternoon. A young girl, about age 6, hollered to me 'What are you doing?' I responded, 'I'm walking.' She looked. . . thought. . . then yelled, 'Who's winning?'". . . Ray Leach has come across a book entitled Track and Field Feats by Peter Matthews, published in 1982, which includes 30 photos on race walking, some in color, plus such tidbits as: Youngest Olympic Gold medalist, walking--Ugo Frigerio, 10 Km, 1920, 18 years 337 days. Oldest Olympic Gold medalist, walking--Thomas Green, Great Britain, 50 Km, 1932, 37 years 126 days. Matthews also writes about Lugano Cups, women's walking, the London-Brighton race, Olympic walks, and various athletes, including Ron Laird. The book is listed at \$17. 95. . . Reno's Rob Campbell twice broke the U.S. Junior 3 Km record last summer, times that unfortunately

went unreported in these pages. In the Pacific Association Meet he did 13:18.1 and then did 13:17:06 in the Athletics Congress Region 13 Junior Olympic meet. . . Indoor 1 Mile walks missing from our schedule are Feb. 11 in San Francisco and Feb. 19 in Richfield, Ohio. Also add to the schedule the Eastern Sectional 50 Km at Stoneybrook, NY on March 27 and the Eastern Sectional 20 Km (track) and Junior and women's 10 Km at Westfield, Mass. on April 2. For both, contact Gary Westerfield, P.O. Box 440, Smithtown, NY 11787. Also add two races on the second weekend in April; a track 5 Km at the Dogwood Relays in Knoxville, Tenn. (Contact San Stimson, Athletic Dept., U. of Tenn., P.O. Box 47, Knoxville, TN 37901) and the Zinn Memorial 10 Km on the boardwalk in Asbury Park, NJ, April 10 (Contact Elliott Denman). Finally, the National Jr. 15 Km is on Aug. 14, not July 31. . .

We get some really nice letters here at the ORW from time to time, and here is one of the nicer. Take those of you out there wondering if your efforts for the sport are really appreciated:

"As I develop as a racewalker, it has become apparent that it is a sport that is hardly known and even more scarcely honored. The only reason race walking is alive and growing in the U.S. are the "old guys". They are a group of very experienced walkers that have either been Olympians, national champions, or casual walkers. They are the same bunch that organize races, hold seminars and classes on walking, really support walking to the max. Among the elite group are Dan Stanek of Buffalo, Howie Jacobson of New York City, Elliott Denman of Long Branch, NJ, Larry Larson of Wisconsin, Ron Laird at the Olympic Training Center, and many others I am not familiar with across the U.S. that promote the once hopelessly lost U.S. race walking program. (Ed. That may be a little strong, because there has always been a group of "old guys" keeping things going.) I salute these individuals who perhaps many take for granted. Without these individuals, not only would many walkers not be walking now, but race walking as we know it would not exist. Once again, thanks, and keep up the work that is so important and that you do so well.

LOOKING BACK

20 Years Ago (From the Jan. 1963 Race Walker of Chris McCarthy)--The cover phot shows John Allen leading Vladimir Golubnichiy, Anatoliy Vedyakov, and Ron Zinn during the previous summer's US-USSR dual, a lead he didn't hold for too long. . . Alex Oakley, Felix Cappella, and Bill Grandy reportedly literally ran away from Ron Laird and Allen in a Toronto mile with Oakley winning in 6:43.3. . . Alan Blakeslee beat Ron Daniel in the Metro mile, 7:04.3 to 7:07. . . Laird turned in a 7:07 and 15:06 in Chicago races.

15 Years Ago (From the Jan. 1968 ORW)--Dave Romansky turned in a sparkling 1:15:49.5 10 mile in Asbury Park on Dec. 31, leaving John Knifton 4½ minutes in arrears. . . Ron Daniel won the Mets this time in 6:39.7 and Ron Laird capped the LA Times mile in 6:32.9. He then came back with a 6:28.2 in the Athens Invitational to top Tom Dooley's 6:33.9 effort. . . Laird won the Ron Zinn Memorial Trophy as the outstanding walker in the country for the second straight year and the fourth time in its history. . . Publisher Jack Blackburn had some commentary on the political scene (costing us one subscriber, as I recall) and Mortland reviewed a Modern Jazz Quartet concert. News was a bit light. . . Finally, the ORW announced the first Dr. John Blackburn Award for the year's outstanding single accomplishment, which went to Larry O'Neil for his 19:24:52.4 100 miler.

10 Years Ago (From the Jan. 1973 ORW)--The Colorado Track Club's 10-man relay team covered 162 miles 275 yards for a world's walking record in the 24-hour relay. And they did it indoors. Jerry Brown led the effort with an average of 7:05.2 for his 17 miles. Floyd Godwin averaged 7:29 and Pete Van Arsdale 7:37.4. . .The MAFI 2 mile went to Steve Tyrer in 15:04, with newcomer Augie Hirt fourth in 15:55. . .Ron Kulik was king of the boards in the East with a 6:40.5 win in the Mets and a 6:35.2 in Philadelphia. Ron Daniel was second in both. In Philly, Howie Palamarchuk, known mostly for his libelous contributions to the infamous Guano Press (race walking's underground paper of that era), was a close third in 6:38.

5 Years Ago (From the Jan. 1978 ORW)--The first page and a half were devoted to the editor's discussion of Columbus in the blizzard of '78 and it's effect on training and such. . .Steve Pecinovsky edged Chris Knotts for fast timehonors in the New Year's Eve Handicap in Springfield with a 48:21 (6 mile). Chris had 48:30. However, the handicapping was tough on the faster walkers as these two finished 6th and 7th in the 10 man field and handicapper Jack Blackburn (50:27) and Jack Blackburn 50:42 brought up the rear. . .John Knifton turned in a good 30 Km (2:30:54) in Houston. . .In the Millrose Games Todd Scully won in 6:34.3 with Ron Daniel 3 seconds back and John Fredericks third.
